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ALL STUDENTS MUST SPEND ONE MONTH AT ONE OF THE PRIMARY TEACHING HOSPITALS (University of Maryland, VA Medical Center or Mercy Medical Center)

Please Note: Core clerkships in each specialty are to be completed before you will be allowed to do a sub-internship in that specialty, unless otherwise noted.

Sub-I's as Electives: Only two sub-internships will be assigned during senior course scheduling. If you wish to take an additional sub-internship as an elective, you should arrange it through the department by doing an add/drop form after the scheduling process for electives has been completed.

Add/Drop: Those students wishing to drop a sub-internship after it has been scheduled **MAY BE REQUIRED TO FIND A REPLACEMENT STUDENT** *and* get the Course Coordinator's approval **ONE MONTH** prior to the scheduled rotation. Students should check the notation at the end of each Sub-internship.

GOALS and OBJECTIVES

Sub-internships offer students an opportunity to perform advanced clinical responsibilities at the level of an intern, with a population of patients with acute medical problems. The Sub-Internship will provide an educational curriculum that emphasizes the teaching of the fundamental concepts of medicine. The Sub-intern will have a clearly identifiable faculty mentor(s)/supervisor(s) for the entire rotation.

Goal and Objectives:

Goal #1: The Sub-intern will develop a comprehensive approach to the care of acutely ill patients, beginning with admission and culminating with either discharge or transfer to another clinical service.

Objectives:

The student, acting in the role of intern, will:

- Demonstrate the ability to apply basic and clinical science knowledge in the clinical setting
- Strengthen basic history and physical diagnostic skills in the care of his/her patients
- Enhance problem-solving skills in the daily evaluation and management of his/her patients
- Enhance the learning of clinical reasoning and judgment

Goal #2: The student will learn to function in the role of house officer.

Objectives:

The student will:

- Demonstrate an ability to effectively work as a member of the house officer team treating acutely ill patients on a common service
- Successfully complete in-house call responsibilities at the level of an intern, including learning to cross-cover patients on their primary service
- Demonstrate effective oral and written communication skills as they relate to patients, patients' medical records, families, colleagues, consultants, and community health providers.
- Demonstrate professional attitudes and behaviors in all interactions with patients, families, colleagues, consultants, and community health providers
- Demonstrate an ability to synthesize patient data within a biopsychosocial context and effectively incorporate into an assessment and ongoing plan of treatment

Title of Course: Sub-Internship in Surgical Critical Care

Description and Goals:

This course is a joint offering from the departments of anesthesiology and surgery. The goal of this course is to provide the student with sound physiologic background and clinical experience for the effective evaluation and management of critically ill patients. The student will participate in daily work and teaching rounds and have responsibility for the care of assigned patients under the direction of the SICU physician team. Students will admit patients to the unit, perform history, physical and laboratory assessments, and present patients on rounds and provide ongoing care. The student will perform any indicated procedures for his/her patient under unit physician supervision. The student will attend unit teaching conferences and relevant institutional conferences, e.g. weekly anesthesiology or surgery grand rounds. During the rotation the student will learn about the clinical evaluation and management of various critical care problems including shock, heart failure, myocardial ischemia/infarction, respiratory failure, ARDS, renal failure, hepatic failure, GI bleeding, sepsis, multi-organ failure, and ethical issues. Experience with complex surgical problems pertaining to liver, kidney, and pancreas transplantation, major vascular, complex GI, urologic, orthopedic, neurosurgery, trauma, gynecology and obstetrics is available in the SICU. The student will become familiar with techniques such as fluid resuscitation, transfusion therapy, vasoactive drug therapy, invasive hemodynamic monitoring, airway management, ventilator support, renal replacement therapy, antibiotic usage and blood gas analysis.

Duration: 4 weeks

Weekends (morning rounds). Call 6-7 times per month.

Title of Course: Student Internship in Family Medicine

Description and Goals:

The Family Medicine Inpatient Service is an active service that admits patients from the Family Health Center as well as unassigned patients from the Emergency Room. There are usually at least 10 patients on the service at any one time. Patients on our service have a wide variety of medical problems and range in age from newborn to elderly, and include OB and post-partum patients. Patients are also followed in telemetry beds. The staff includes an attending physician from the Family Medicine faculty, one first, one second, and one third year resident, and one or two fourth year medical students. There are many educational opportunities that focus on patient care, including formal attending rounds every day, daily morning report, weekly Grand Rounds and behavioral rounds.

Our goals are:

1. To function as a teaching model for residents and medical students in the care of inpatients using the Family Medicine approach (holistic care, continuity of care, patient education, interdisciplinary team approach, family needs).
2. To provide continuity of care for Family Medicine patients.
3. To augment student's skills and knowledge in caring for hospitalized patients.

Responsibilities:

The senior resident who is in charge of the service will assign patients to the interns and student(s). Students act as sub-interns and manage their patients completely from admission history and physical to discharge. Any procedures that need to be done are the student's responsibility. Close supervision is always available.

Title of Course: Critical Care Medicine (MICU)

Description and Goals:

The goal of this rotation is to learn the Principals of critical care medicine. Students will learn how to care for patients with a variety of critical care illnesses, including pulmonary, kidney, liver, heart and central nervous system failure. Students will also learn the Principals of ventilator and hemodynamic management, develop expertise in interpreting x-rays of critically ill patients, and understand the ethical issues associated with caring for the critically ill patient. Finally, students will learn how to perform a variety of procedures, including central line insertion and endotracheal intubation.

Title of Course: Student Internship in Medicine

Description and Goals:

This program in Internal Medicine offers students an in-depth experience caring for patients with a wide range of pathology in an efficiently run community hospital. Senior students function as vital members of patient care teams. Patient care teams are comprised of two or three students and three or four first year residents supervised by a senior resident and a full-time teaching attending. The housestaff program is integrated with the University of Maryland; thus students are supervised by University of Maryland residents. Students are given ample opportunity to learn and perform bedside diagnostic procedures. They are expected to participate in Morning Report and to attend Journal Club, Grand Rounds and subspecialty teaching conferences. Experience in caring for both service and private patients is provided. The student-intern is encouraged to take primary initiative in clinical decision making and general care of his/her patients, be they service or private.

Each student-intern cares for four to seven patients at any one time. Night call is every fourth to sixth night, depending on staffing. Sunday through Thursday, a night float team arrives at 9 p.m. Phlebotomy and fluid teams, patient transportation services, efficient clinical laboratory and radiology departments, and other ancillary services allow students to use their time for meaningful patient care activities.

Meals, parking, and on-call rooms are provided by the hospital.

Title of Course: Sub-Internship in Neurosurgery

Description and Goals:

The student works as an intern in patient care on the service, spending three weeks primarily on the elective service and, if desired, one week on the Neurotrauma Service. The student participates in the full activities of the Department of Neurosurgery. Cases are assigned to each student, who will review diagnostic studies and scrub or be in the operating room on those cases. The majority of cases are patients with brain tumors or cerebrovascular diseases, pediatric neurosurgery problems, spinal disorder or epilepsy. Students will admit patients to the unit, perform history, physical and laboratory assessments, and present patients on rounds and provide ongoing care. The student will perform any indicated procedures for his/her patient under unit physician supervision. The student will attend unit teaching conferences and relevant institutional conferences, including daily lectures, bi-weekly M & M conferences and Grand Rounds lectures.

During the rotation the student will learn about the clinical evaluation and management of various critical care problems including shock, heart failure, myocardial ischemia/infarction, respiratory failure, ARDS, renal failure, hepatic failure, GI bleeding, sepsis, multi-organ failure and ethical issues. The student will become familiar with techniques such as fluid resuscitation, transfusion therapy, vasoactive drug therapy, invasive hemodynamic monitoring, airway management, ventilator support, renal replacement therapy, antibiotic usage and blood gas analysis. Student activities are closely supervised by attending surgeons and fellows.
